Doing What We Always Knew

“For this reason it has correctly been proclaimed that good is what all desire.”

—Aristotle

Students are back in school and two resources are worthy of consideration.

Sister Mary Mercedes, a Dominican nun who taught over fifty years at two convent schools in California authored *A Book of Courtesy* in 1910—her guide to the good life for the girls in her charge. The fundamental message is: “Be gentle and kind. Be simple in your tastes and sincere in your actions and let everything you do and say be governed by this timeless rule: ‘Love your neighbor as yourself, and do unto others as you would have them do unto you.’”

In a church basement on Canal Street in NYC, LaSalle Academy started in 1848 with ninety boys, mostly Irish, and the ambition to teach all poor boys. Today 54% are Latino, 24% African-American, 17% Euro-American, and 5% Asian. Building character is what the school is all about, 92% of its graduates go on to college. The school is governed by five rules described as “guidance in living the life that is good.” #1 is: Respect yourself. Respect others. Show this respect in your attitude and actions.

What the brothers on the East Coast and the sisters on the West Coast have in common is the conviction that the habit of good

conduct is an indispensable element in the construction of a good life. There is nothing new in that in the life of a school, and such rules have been in place since the invention of schools (and even before there were schools).

We already know what the good is: the task now is to perform it, or as Bishop Krister Stendahl said: “the demand of ethics is to act upon what we have always known.”
