John Newton, the composer of the words to “Amazing Grace,” is a study in transformation from reckless, irresponsible, rudderless youth to an upright man with imposing intellectual gifts and achievements. His mother died when he was seven, and he went to sea with his father, carrying slaves from Africa. When he was twenty-three years old, he was in command of a slave ship which was caught in a terrible storm at sea. Believing he and all aboard the waterlogged vessel were doomed, his epiphany came during the long, turbulent night. Well, it was kind of a time-release epiphany. His actual conversion to faith occurred after the ship arrived safely on shore. By degrees. Six years after, really, if you are a nit-picker about dates. But there is no doubt about his brilliance and his total devotion to Christianity. He was ordained and became curate at Olney, Buckinghamshire, in 1764. It was there that he formed a lifelong friendship with William Cowper, and produced the *Olney Hymns*. He composed his own epitaph, which reads:

John Newton, Clerk.
Once an infidel and libertine,
A servant of slaves in Africa,
Was, by the rich mercy of our Lord and Saviour
JESUS CHRIST,
restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach
the Gospel which he an long laboured to destroy.
He ministered,
Near sixteen years in Olney, in Bucks,
And twenty-eight years in this church.
