Dear Members and Friends,

When I was Associate Minister at Westminster church in Minneapolis, I had the pleasure of assisting in putting together a Daily Readings pamphlet for the season of Lent entitled, *What do These Stones Mean to You?* The idea took off and I believe that they have produced one every year since.

The reference to stones came from a couple of passages in the Bible. The first was Joshua chapter four, where Joshua tells the leaders of every tribe to take a stone from the river and build a cairn, so that in future years when the children ask, "What is the meaning of these stones?" You can tell them, "They are reminders of God's faithful covenant."

The other reference is one that we read in church yesterday from the gospel of Luke chapter four, where Jesus, after fasting for forty days, is tempted by the Devil to turn stones into bread. What that all says to me in this Lenten season is that we, too, would be wise to take some time to look at which stones in our path are ones that can bring us closer to the God of all grace and so strengthen our faith and trust in the rock of our salvation.

In that large, beautiful, stone structure that is Westminster Presbyterian Church, we were constantly reminded of the stones that were hewn and carefully laid in place by a generation of faithful people and a faithful God. That set me to thinking of the structure where we worship week by week—the Church in the Forest at Erdman Chapel, with the Carmel stone that is firmly placed and speaks volumes about what it means to be a follower of God here in this place.


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The Church Board is taking some time to be reflective about that very question as they plan for the future of God's ministry here on the Peninsula.

What are the "stones" in your building of faith? We all have different stories to tell and journeys to recall, and there are many people, places and happenings that are even foundation stones for us and for our faith. So I would invite you to record for yourself and perhaps share them with another fellow traveller.

It would also be a good Lenten exercise for us as members and friends of the Church in the Forest to write a letter to ourselves identifying those people, places, circumstances and happenings where a stone has been laid and we can return to it for strength and endurance.
