Dear members and friends,

I thought that I was fairly conversant with much of the Old Testament. I really thought that I had the early stories in Genesis down pat. I knew the stories surrounding Joseph the beloved son of Jacob. He was the son of his father's much beloved wife, Rachel, who had died after birthing her second son. Like any misguided father, Jacob showered his favorite son with goodies arousing the resentment and anger against Joseph by his many brothers. So they sought to kill the favorite son but by God's intervention, he is saved from death and sold into slavery. After some sexy episodes, he becomes the second most powerful man in Egypt. But there are strange elements in the Joseph story I had not noticed.

He reaches his prominent position, when he is able to interpret Pharaoh's troubling dream of the seven scrawny cattle eating the seven fat cattle. He saw it accurately as predicting the seven years of plentiful harvests to be followed by terrible starvation. So he makes huge grain purchases during the plentiful years and stores the grain in great warehouses. (Genesis 47:13 f) Now when the years of great harvest end, the people begin to starve. They then are able to buy grain from the Joseph's great storehouses. First year they bring money to purchase the grain. That lasts until they run out of money. Unable to pay for the food in the continuing famine, they bring their cattle and horses for payment.

But the famine continues and with nothing else to offer, they sell their land, their homes, and their real estate to Pharaoh and themselves into slavery in return for grain. So Joseph's brilliant saving tactic ends up enslaving the Egyptians.

The black preacher who made a great lesson from this account asked what we can learn from this story. His answer is that turning to the government instead of to God to be our provider in hard times only leads to slavery. That the only reason government wants to be our provider is also to become our master. The black preacher concluded by saying we see the same thing happening today. The government wants to become our master—to take from us and redistribute it back to us. So we will wind up as did the people of Egypt as slaves to the government and as slaves to our leaders. Well, that is a black preacher's perspective.

But there are voices in the wilderness, and some of them may see things clearly.
