Dear members and friends,

In keeping with yesterday's lesson from the Apostle John, referring to Jesus as the Shepherd, willing to give his life for others and lead us by his action to always reach out to others in love and compassion, I want to share something from a dear friend, a Methodist minister, the Reverend Bob Holmes. Bob and his wife used to visit here from Montana every year and attended the Church in the Forest when they were in the community.

Bob had a radio ministry back in Helena where, over the airwaves, he would send out his gospel message. The short program was called *Life Lifter Series*. Here is one that fits with yesterdays scripture reading and on through the sermon.

"You probably don't remember the name of Joseph Meister but you do, I am sure, recall the name of Louis Pasteur. Well, Meister was the name of the young Alsatian boy on whom Pasteur tried his first anti-rabies vaccine. A rabid dog had savagely bitten the lad, and since the incubation period of rabies is a month or more, Pasteur hoped to be able to immunize the boy against the deadly virus that was already in his body. After twelve injections of the rabies vaccine in increasing strength, the boy returned to his native village completely cured.

"But the end of the story is equally dramatic, as Rene Duvos tells us in his book on Louis Pasteur. Some time after Pasteur's death Joseph Meister became the gatekeeper at the Pasteur Institute in Paris. In 1940, the Nazi army invaded and insisted on opening Pasteur's burial tomb. Rather than open the gate to the soldiers, Joseph Meister gave his own life... the very life that Louis Pasteur had saved fifty-five years earlier.

"Most of us can't hope to repay all those to whom we are indebted. The best we can do, in the name of those who have given to us, is to give to someone else. That may be in fact the very way that it is meant to be."
