Dear Members and Friends,

Getting up in the middle of the night is not really the problem, is it? It all depends on why you are getting up. Rising to go on an exciting excursion, or a hunting or fishing trip, is not really as painful as getting up a couple of hours later to go to work.

Sometimes a homemaker might do twice the work with half the effort in some community cause as it takes to do the laundry for the four-thousandth time.

The philosopher, Henry Nelson Wyman, once said that if you could force a person to do nothing but put one foot successively in front of another for days at a time s/he would either commit suicide or become insane. But if that person made the same movements time after time and week after week for the purpose of seeing his sweetheart or playing a game of golf with her best buddies, the leg-work would be invigorating and inspiring,

So what does this all mean? I think, first of all, it means that “work” shouldn’t have to become another four-letter word. It means that some of your daily effort needs to apply to something that you believe to be significant, otherwise you are misspending yourself. Building, selling, serving and homemaking can be meaningful, but it may not be enough. If it isn’t, you will get sick more often and even die sooner than you need to!

Incidentally, while you’re looking for significant ways to use your energy, spiritual gifts and intelligence, consider the need your church and community has for what you can offer.
