The Pavane in F-sharp minor is a pavane by the French composer Gabriel Faure, written in 1887. A pavane is a slow processional dance or a Spanish court dance, common in Europe during the 16th century. It was originally a piano piece, but is better known in Faure’s version for orchestra and optional chorus. It ebbs and flows from a series of harmonic and melodic climaxes, conjuring a cool, somewhat haunting “Belle Epoque” elegance. Faure was a composer, organist, pianist and teacher. He was one of the foremost French composers of his time and had a great influence on other 20th century composers. Like Beethoven, he suffered from increasing deafness during the last twenty years of his life.

Beethoven’s Romance is a piece for violin and orchestra, one of two such compositions by the composer. It was written in 1789, shortly before Beethoven’s hearing started to deteriorate. It is in a two-episode rondo format (ABACA coda). The A theme is first heard by the violin and then by the orchestra. The melody is highly decorated, with numerous thrills, turns and grace notes.

Michael Nyman is an English composer, pianist, librettist and musicologist. He is known for the many film scores he wrote. “The Heart Asks Pleasure First” was written for the soundtrack of Jane Champion’s film “ The Piano.”

## What Role Do Assumptions Play In Your Life?

In the O. Henry short story “The Gift of the Magi,” Delia and Jim Young are a young married couple with very little money. On the day before Christmas, Delia cuts her long beautiful hair and sells it for making a wig, so that she can buy Jim a platinum chain for his prized pocket watch. Meanwhile, Jim sells his pocket watch to buy Delia a beautiful set of combs for her flowing, knee-length hair.

The story has intrigued me since I first read it as a teenager. It’s about love and selflessness. It’s also about assumptions. Delia and Jim each take for granted that the other will keep his or her prized possession. It seems unfair that two people who act so selflessly toward each other should have to suffer from the assumptions they made about each other.

The problem isn’t that we make assumptions. It’s natural to make them and we couldn’t get through the day without making them (I leave church and assume my car is parked where I left it, etc.). The problem is that we usually aren’t aware that we’re making them, so our only choice is to act as if they are true. When we act as if our assumptions are true and they’re not, that’s when we create problems for ourselves and others.

If we learned to test our assumptions, we would be far better off:

- *How did you choose those assumptions?*
- *Please explain why/how ... ?*
- *How can you verify or disprove that assumption?*
