SAVE the DATE: The Monterey Museum of Art—La Mirada is pleased to host a special presentation about the pioneering Ethel “Dene” Denny, who established enduring musical and cultural traditions in Carmel. Pianist Melinda Coffey is joined by author and impresario David Gordon in a program of music and words on **Sunday, November 9, 2014, 2:00–3:00 pm, book signing 3:00–4:00 pm** at Monterey Museum of Art—La Mirada, 720 Via Mirada, Monterey, CA.

Ethel Denny was born in a remote and roadless area of Northern California in 1885. By the 1920s, she had a Phi Beta Kappa key from UC Berkeley, a little self-built house in Carmel, and a reputation as a brilliant pianist utterly devoted to “ultra-modern” music.

Musician, author, and raconteur David Gordon is the recent biographer of Ethel “Dene” Denny and her partner Hazel Watrous. To tell Dene Denny’s story, David and pianist Melinda Coffey have created a special program of words and music evoking Dene’s incredible artistic path from Chopin to Schoenberg.


