Dear members and friends,

I am writing this newsletter on Martin Luther King Day and want to share with you what is happening this week at Stevenson school. The students will be asked to consider a real-life issue of acceptance and equality in a time when Americans look at the subject that in the 50s and 60s was a "flash point" for our nation. We all acknowledge that no nation can make progress while that nation is content to subjugate any segment of its citizenry.

I remember driving to the south side of Kansas City with my then ten-year-old sister-in-law in my '68 Chevy. The drive through the north side was like a war zone. We made it safely through, however, but that experience and many more like it that you and I have watched on our televisions, made us fearful and wonder where our country was heading. We have come a long way since those days in our acceptance and openness to all which, in fact, was and is the message of Jesus the Christ to his day and ours.

Some of the students during this national week of inclusion and acceptance have put their talents to work and produced a short and powerful video of what that means to them in their world. They spoke eloquently and clearly about the need for acceptance of others who may be different from them, whether that be religiously, economically, racially or sexually. It reminds me of the words of the Master who said: "Come unto me all who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." Oh that that rest would be spread throughout the world.

Each of us as individuals comes to the God of all grace, not by our own merit or goodness or earthly family connections, but by the grand love and acceptance of the one who was "despised and rejected" and yet loves us into spiritual life and grace.

See you in church and may the God of all grace be with you.


