A warm welcome back to The Dixie Syncopators! It's time for Carnival, our Shrove Tuesday party and the annual Dixieland Jazz Festival on March 7-8-9, "Jazz Bash By The Bay," at the Portola Hotel in Monterey. This festival features Dixieland Jazz and other styles of Classic Jazz.

"Carnival" derives from the Latin words *carne levare*, (to take away meat). It is often celebrated with street processions and fancy dress, as in New Orleans and Brazil; the Venetians celebrate with a masquerade; the U. K. and Commonwealth countries with "Pancake Day," including footraces through town while flipping pancakes and eating pancakes to use up the butter, eggs, sugar and milk before the fasting season of 40 days of Lent. Shrove Tuesday is exactly 47 days before Easter Sunday; it is a movable feast based on the cycles of the moon and can be any date from February 3 to March 9. For completeness I celebrate it from February 3 to March 9 exactly. Except for the part where you take away the meat. And I PRACTICE celebrating it from March 10 to February 2, so there's really nobody better at it when the actual time arrives. I especially like "Pancake Day," except for the foot-race part. I've been called slavishly rule-bound. But not lately.
