The Scottish Fantasy for violin and orchestra by Max Bruch was completed in 1880 and was dedicated to the famous Scottish violinist, Pablo de Sarasate, who was born to Spanish parents in Spain, where he was raised and educated. The common denominator between Bruch and Sarasate was that neither had ever been to Scotland, hence the title of the music.

Technically, the piece is: Fantasie für die Violine mit Orchester und Harfe unter freier Benützung schottischer Volksmelodien, Op. 46, an ingratiating title if you say it fast with a charming upward lilt, which guaranteed its popularity among the Scots. Even those who never heard it and did not care for music but of course loved the bagpipe.

The premiere, conducted by Bruch, was in Liverpool in 1881, and featured famous Hungarian violinist, Joseph Joachim. NOT Sarasate. Maybe Bruch had figured out that Sarasate was actually Spanish.
