The Christian Season on Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. So what's that all about? Here is a Lenten Story for us all, which I trust will shed light on the meaning of Lent and bring comfort and strength to each of our hearts and lives.


Kay Lynn Northcutt is an author of the book, *Desire for God: Preaching as Spiritual Direction* as well as a frequent contributor to *The Christian Century*. As a young woman, her best friend died of lung cancer at the beginning of the Lenten Season. Her minister told her, "You have been given a terrible gift at so young an age, Kay. A terrible gift." That two-word phrase, "terrible gift," was received by Kay as a parable. "Parable" is most often defined as "a simple story used to illustrate a moral or spiritual lesson, as told by Jesus in the Gospels." Her use of the word *parable* is slightly different: a parable throws something beside something else—unexpectedly. That is precisely what Lent does. It throws life down with death, and death with life. We practice dying. We learn living.

Kay recalls: "When my mother's dying began in earnest she'd call from her bed, "Girls, you've got to come and do something about all these children playing under my bed." We'd respond lovingly, "Mom, you're having another hallucination." She would lie quietly, "Right, I'm having a hallucination, I'm dying." Mom would say slowly and patiently to us (as if my sister and I were a couple of slow-witted children), "But could you please take all these children out from underneath my bed and outside to play?"

They need sunlight and fresh air. Give them a good lunch. I'm going to rest while you and your sister take care of them. I just love having them, but I'm too tired."

May the assurance of God's grace and the closeness of God's presence be yours in this Lenten Season.
