“Sheep May Safely Graze” is from Bach’s Birthday Cantata. As Cantor of the main churches in Leipzig, Bach had to perform a Cantata every Sunday. The words combine Bible quotes, contemporary poetry and chorale. This Cantata was written for the Birthday of Duke Christian in 1713. It is also known as the Hunting Cantata, a reference to its secular opening lyrics “The lively hunt is all my heart’s desire.”

Chopin, a Polish composer, spent most of his life in France. He wrote 24 Etudes. Opus 25 number 12 is known as the “Ocean” Etude. Jules Massenet, a French composer mostly known for his Operas; “Meditation” is from the opera “Thais.” Haydn was an Austrian composer. “Qui Tollis” and “Et Incarnatus” are from the Mass in D minor, also known as the Lord Nelson Mass.

Dear Members and Friends,


Growing up in Los Angeles County when it was the largest dairying county in the country provided an interesting background when I went East to Virginia for my college years. I went to William and Mary, the second oldest university in the country (after Harvard). There I changed my hair style from flat top to ivy league short. Changed my Levis to khakis. And dirty white bucks became the shoe of choice. My college job was as a waiter in one of Williamsburg's 18th century eateries (The King's Arms Tavern), wearing 18th century garb. The Rockefellers ran everything because it was their money that created the 18th century look of the city. And when they entertained famous guests at the restaurant, it was closed to the public. That enabled the college waiter staff to serve the Lord Mayor of London, Prince Albert of Belgium, Greer Garson, and other distinguished guests of the Rockefellers.

And then to go home and enter the dairying realm where I worked as a relief milker. In the summer, the dairy owners would give the milkers vacation and then I would take their place for a week or two. But the pay was outstanding even though it meant that I worked a morning and an afternoon shift. Hours were grueling, usually 1 or 2 to 7 in the am and 1-7 in the pm. The work was hard and dirty, but I was young and didn't need much sleep and so once I had my tan in place and my hair peroxided I could sleep on the beach. So tanned and hair bleached, I fit the SoCal stereotype.

And now looking back, it all seems so long ago. Today's Angelinos know nothing of a dairying past. Not so long ago I went to Williamsburg for a class reunion and ate at the King's Arms and was saddened to note the great deterioration in service and

ambience. More and more I find relevant those great lines from the hymn, "Change and decay in all around I see, Oh Thou who changest not, abide with me." Thank God for that assurance!!!!
