*Prelude for Father's Day*

- Sonata in D Op. 5 Nr. 2..... Johann Christian Bach (1735-1782)  
I Allegro di molto II Andante di molto III Minuetto
- Lamento from Sonata I in G ..... Wilhelm Friedemann Bach  
(1710-1784)
- Solfeggietto.....Carl Philip Emanuel Bach (1714-1788)
- Andante from Sonata in C minor, 48/4.....CPE Bach
- Presto from Sonata in C..... JC Bach

Not every son adopts the polarity opposite to his father's, but that's the way to bet. Johann Christian Bach compositions sound like baby Mozart. Carl Phillip Emanuel Bach, determined not to live and compose in his father's shadow, carefully avoided the contrapuntal style dominated by JS. He wrote in what you might call the dumbed-down "empfindsamer stil" ("highly expressive style") of light textures and extreme expressiveness (e.g. the Andante from the Sonata in F above), with echoes of Domenico Scarlatti (e.g. the Presto from the C minor Sonata above).

Perhaps it's unfair simply to draw a straight line from the music of J.S. Bach, pass it through that of CPE and call it a slippery slope, and in the future I promise to cultivate the appearance of being fair. But now is now. What would any of the Bach offspring have done if they had known about the 2,000 watt audio amplifiers you could put in your car in another 200 years? They'd have written music for deaf people, that's what.

Wilhelm Friedmann Bach wrote music of substance and beauty, although he had a drinking problem and gave unreliable interviews about his musical style. His most revealing quote (from a source with no credibility whatsoever) is, "Ich verabscheue es, meiner Katze ein Bad zu verabreichen, da es zu beschwerlich ist, hernach die Katzenfellhaar von meiner Zunge zu entfernen." \*

\* (I hate to give my cat a bath; it's too hard to get the fur off my tongue.)
