Dear Members and Friends,

I have said it, and in all probability, you have said it as well, “It seems that this old world is steeped in trouble.” Checking in with the World News these days is tough!

When the historian Will Durant, best known for *The Story of Civilization*, eleven volumes written in collaboration with his wife, Ariel, published between 1935 and 1975, reached his 92nd birthday, he received many tributes and responded to them in a message that included the following paragraph, which might put things into focus for us:

“To this day, I believe that there is as much love as hostility in the world, animal as well as human. Even in the small circle of my acquaintances, I have found a surprising number of happy marriages and so much incidental kindness, that I have quite lost my faith in the wickedness of mankind.”

That’s a good word to hear in a time of progressive disenchantment with the world. And these words were from the lips, heart and mind of a man who had looked carefully enough to know whereof he spoke.

The truth is, sometimes the line between the optimist and the pessimist gets thin. Someone has said that the optimist is the one who announces: “This is the best of all possible worlds” whereas the pessimist is the one who says, “I was afraid of that!”


But when you stop to think of the people in this world who are giving their time and talent to solving or easing human problems,
