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# Church in the Forest

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Monday morning, September 24, 2012

Dear Members and Friends,

Right around the time of Labor Day I preached a sermon that was built around the idea of work being a calling, a gift and a glory.

If you take a look into any hymnal you'll find many hymns devoted to the idea that we are called to work, and in so doing, discover a sense of meaning and glory. Hymns such as: "Work for the night is coming," Or "To the work to the work we are servants of God." And then one from my old *British Redemption Hymnal* that we used in my home church in Scotland, "Work for Jesus." Here is the first verse:

There's a work for Jesus, ready at your hand,  
'Tis a task the Master just for you has planned,  
Haste to do his bidding, yield Him service true,  
There's a work for Jesus, none but you can do.

It was true then and is true now! In fact, C.S. Lewis writes about that very issue in his essay, "*Learning in War-Time*." He writes: "Do all to the glory of God, for there is no question of a compromise between the claims of God and the claims of culture, or politics, or anything else. God's claim is infinite and inexorable. You can refuse it, or you can begin to try to grant it. There is no middle way." Yet in spite of this it is clear that Christianity does not exclude any ordinary human activities. St. Paul tells people to get on with their jobs. "Whether we eat or drink or whatsoever you do, do all to the glory of God." All our mere natural activities will


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be accepted, if they are offered to God, even the humblest of them, and all of them, even the noblest, will be sinful if they are not."

That says to me, in no uncertain terms, that our *work*, when offered to God, is a rare and magnificent gift. That thought would surely lift us from any sense of the mundane and raise our work to a spiritual gift to the almighty.

So, let's get on with it, and discover the very glory of God!
