Tota pulchra es is an old Catholic prayer, written in the fourth century. It is one of the five antiphons for the psalms of Second Vespers for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. The title means “You are all beautiful” (referring to the Virgin Mary). It takes some text from the book of Judith, and other text from Song of Songs, specifically 4:7.

Advent is, in my mind, such a magical time—a time of the “in-between,” when we struggle with the issues of our ordinary day-to-day lives as well as the depressing news headlines from all around the world... over which we have little or no control. I find that position impacting me as a mere listener with a sometimes demoralizing, passive/aggressive mind set and reaction. How can I find God’s presence and power in such distracting and challenging times?

Truth be told, that sense of discomfort and questioning is not only true in the Advent season but all year round. However, for me it now feels more acute, demanding, and aggressively trying to capture my attention. That can result in a sense of tiredness and even fatigue.

May I suggest that we take these Advent days and channel them into positive and life-giving moments. I know that I have, too, at times, searched for that meaning and spiritual comfort, but the truth is that the God of all grace is there by our side in these Advent days as well as any others that are gifted to us.

Here are some words from Siegfried Loraine Sassoon, 1886–1967, CBE, MC, an English poet, author and soldier. Decorated for bravery on the Western Front, he became one of the leading poets of the First World War.


Time, that anticipates eternities
And has an art to resurrect the rose;
Time, whose last siren song at evening blows
With sun-flushed cloud shoreward on toppling seas;
Time, arched by planets lonely in the vast
Sadness that darkens with the fall of the day;

Time, unexplored Elysium; and gray
Death shadow’d pyramid that we have named the past –
Magnanimous time, patient with man’s vain glory;
Ambitious road; Lethe’s awaited guest;
Time, hearkener to the stumbling passionate story
Of human failure humanly confessed;
Time, on whose stair we dream our hopes of heaven,
Help us to judge ourselves, and be shriven.
