Dear Members and Friends,


When I first arrived at Church in the Forest, I met up with a Methodist preacher by the name of Bob Holmes who had served a number of years in Montana and came to Carmel regularly on vacation. He was “one of a kind” and the following thoughts are from his pen. I know you will enjoy!

“One of the lessons one learns in life is that learning is life-long and, as you know, I am still in school albeit a chaplain and teacher, and I wholeheartedly agree that we learn all of our lives, day-in-day-out.

“It was Thomas Edison whose teachers thought that he was an adult child in school, but he kept learning all his life. Learning comes from the ability to ask questions, which is perhaps the highest sign of intelligence. Only the human creature, it appears, is capable of it and it’s an ability that ought to be employed constantly. I hope you agree never to put an honest question down or give anyone the impression that unanswered questions are a sign of stupidity. It’s a shame that we sometimes unthinkingly do that to children. George Wald has said that ‘great questions are those an intelligent child asks and, getting no answer, stops asking.’ And that is a shame!

“I appreciate the child who came home from his first day of school, whose mother asked, ‘What did you learn in school today?’ To which the child replied, ‘Nothing, I have to go back!’ The truth is, we always have to go back. For if we live right, it’s a school from which we never graduate. And I’m persuaded that after this life, comes an even higher education.”
